The Oklahoma State Constitution states

Under the Oklahoma Constitution, there's no constitutional right to school-based healthcare. In fact, the state constitution clearly states that the primary purpose of public schools is academics and free from sectarian control. There is no mention of state funded healthcare clinics on K-12 public school campuses.

Title 210.State Department of Education. Chapter 1. State Board of Education.

Subchapter 1. General Provisions 210:1-1-1. Declaration of Foundational Values

“...academics are the primary purpose of public schools... It cannot be said that a school is functioning as a school unless its students are made literate...The ultimate responsibility of children’s education rests firmly upon the shoulders of their parents. All responsibilities of an educator and servant of public education are responsibilities delegated from these parents and guardians, and such responsibilities are to be taken with full sobriety and respect as is befitting the care and training of all children.”

What are K-12 School-Based Health Centers/clinics?

- Are promoted by the CDC, World Health Organization (WHO), NEA, Planned Parenthood, and the LGBTQ organizations.
- K-12 School-Based Health Centers (SBHC) are student-focused socialized healthcare services on school campus and off campus and modeled after the CDC's Whole School, Whole Community, Whole Child (WSCC) with an **anti-parent agenda**.
- Parental consent authorizes any health care provider and professional clinical staff to provide medical tests, diagnoses, procedures, and treatments **w/out presence of the parent**.



Creates intentional and unintentional Medicaid fraud
Fraudulent Individualized Educational Plans (IEP)

Services provided in SBHCs include **but are not limited to:**

- Reproductive counseling and birth control.
- The students will seek care from individuals without vetting from the parents.
- Vaccinations, pharmaceuticals, cross gender hormones, psychological/behavioral therapy without parental knowledge.
- Gender affirming therapy





Medical Ethics: First do no harm

No K-12 School-Based Healthcare Centers

Conflicts with Medical Ethics

- Medical ethics **doesn't** allow physicians to make medical decisions for a minor.
- Medical ethics **doesn't** allow physicians to treat minors without a parent present.
- In the name of "Privacy", parents may not be informed of treatment or diagnosis for their child.
- Parents **MUST** be present at the time of treatment to

PREVENT A POWER IMBALANCE

School-based mental health education and services creates:

- Group think.
- Delayed trauma.
- Creates unhealthy children.
- Overtreatment of children.

Overtreatment refers to interventions that do not benefit the patient or where the risk of harm from the intervention is likely to outweigh any benefit the patient will receive.

2004 Public Concerns shared with Congress

1. To bill Medicaid for educational services would deplete medical benefits that should be directed to families.
2. Potential for unintentional and intentional Medicaid fraud
3. Potential for fraudulent Individualized Educational Plans (IEP)

All federal education law is in Title 20 of the United States Code.

The special education provision, IDEA 2004, begins at Section 1400, this is cited as 20 USC § 1400

Oklahoma, Okla. Admin. Code § 317:30-5-1020.

**Gives
School-based Medicaid oversight
to
Oklahoma Health Care Authority (OHCA)**

➤ OHCA is required to perform billing & IEP audits.

- The purpose of an IEP can be found at Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) section 300.34
- IDEA defines an IEP as specially designed instruction.
- According to IDEA, schools are not required to provide medically necessary therapeutic services or medical services.

- Since 2004, we have seen an **inflation** of IEPs, raising the question:

“How many IEPs are fraudulent ?”

- The statute requires OHCA to perform school audits (IEPs & billing).
- July 2024, I interview an OHCA employee and told **they don't audit schools.**
- July 2024, the OHCA employee said they are working with the K-12 public schools **to expand** school-based healthcare for all low-income children.



IEP FRAUD

1. School-based Medicaid's enrollment requires an IEP.
2. Are these IEPs being verified for special education eligibility per IDEA?
3. Each school year, does OHCA update their data base of students with IEPs?



Program success requires
“buy in” from teachers, parents, community
AND
FUNDING

**Sustainability after
Federally Qualified Health Center
grant expires**

- Requires **state funding**, continued financial support from their academic partner, and health care institution.
- SBHC sustainability is linked to billable patient visits.

**What are the
elements of
informed consent?**



Informed Parental Consent: in the contexts of legal ethics, medical treatment, and waiver of constitutional rights.

Informed parental consent for treatment or participation in an activity AFTER being FULLY informed about:

1. Relevant facts
2. Relevant risks
3. Available alternatives
4. The decision is made with a complete understanding of the situation
5. Allowing for a knowledgeable, voluntary, and uncoerced choice.

“ The essence of the revision permits a “first time” “consent” from the parent to access the Medicaid benefits. Thereafter no further consent is needed to access Medicaid benefits, but the parent shall receive an annual notice that benefits are being accessed by the school district.”

7/11/2024 spoke with employee at the
US Dept of Education to confirm final
rule to remove parental consent under
Part B of IDEA.

US Dept of Education currently working
on final rule and has not published yet.

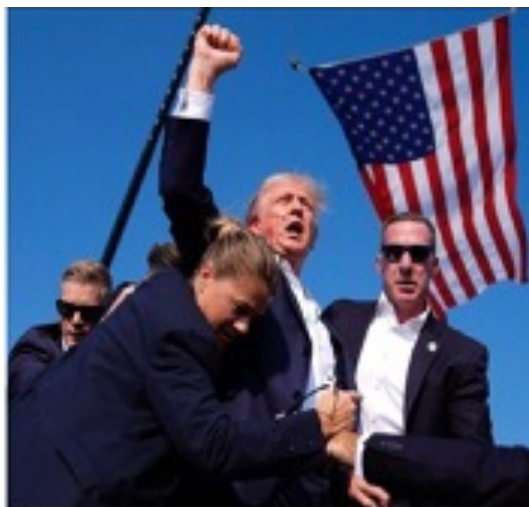
**School-based Medicaid enrollment
